Have you ever had the urge to get away to a far away place? Ron and Joanne Humphrey have had those urges and acted on them. Ron has sailed on sailboats to Hawaii and Mexico. Joanne has taught in the wilds of Alaska, where they had to fly her in a pontoon plane. Well, they're at it again! Last year they went to the interior jungles of Guatemala, and they're planning to go there again in February. They're going to revisit an area where the ancient Mayans still live, many speaking their Mayan tongues, unable to speak Spanish, the official language of Guatemala. They will arrive in Santo Tomas de Castillia on the west coast as part of their Caribbean cruise, then go by small fishing boats on the Rio Dulce, and then on small tributaries to AKTenamit, where there is a special educational project sponsored by the Rotarians for 150 Mayan children from the surrounding jungle. In a series of thatched huts they are taught skills that will assist them in living at a better than poverty level, ranging from growing and milling corn, to making and selling souvenirs to tourists.

The Humphreys have taken photographs of the Mayans and their jungle environment and way of life, which they plan to publish as a small book, with colored photographs and descriptions of their school. The Mayans could sell the books to tourists to help support themselves.
